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# Bonds decline, call rates rise on demand from borrowing banks

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MUMBAI: Government bonds (G-Secs) declined on selling pressure from banks and corporates but the overnight call money rates finished higher following fresh demand from borrowing banks amid tight liquidity in the banking system.



The 7.59 per cent government security maturing in 2026 fell to Rs 108.70 from Rs 109.1350 previously, while its yield went-up to 6.32 per cent from 6.26 per cent.

The 6.97 per cent government security maturing in 2026 slid to Rs 105.3475 from Rs 105.70, while its yield moved up to 6.23 per cent from 6.18 per cent.

The 7.61 per cent government security maturing in 2030 dipped to Rs 110.6650 from Rs 111.2050, while its yield edged up to 6.41 per cent from 6.36 per cent.

The 7.59 per cent government security maturing in 2029, the 7.88 per cent government security maturing in 2030 and the 7.68 per cent government security maturing in 2023 were also quoted lower at Rs 109.80, Rs 112.50 and Rs 108.20 respectively.

The overnight call money rates finished higher at 5.90 per cent from Thursday's level 5.80 per cent. It resumed higher at 6.25 per cent and moved in a wide range 6.25 per cent and 5.40 per cent.

Meanwhile, the Reserve Bank of India (RBI), under the [Liquidity Adjustment Facility](#), purchased securities worth Rs 21.67 billion in a 7-bids at the 3-day at a fixed rate of 6.25 per cent as on today, while its sold securities worth Rs 86.96 billion from 39-bids at the overnight reverse repo auction at a fixed rate of 5.75 per cent as on November 24.

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
